CHESTNUTS The children have had lots of fun playing outside on the trim trail and taking part in Forest School activities. Our Forest School area is becoming guite muddy, so please ensure your child comes in with suitable clothing for outdoor learning, including waterproofs

and wellies if possible. Children also need gloves when it is very cold. This week, we have been emptying the water from our pond, and the children have enjoyed helping with this. This is all part of giving our pond a a makeover, ready for the spring! This week, the children have been practising their listening and following instruction skills through fun games such as Simon Says. Our focus letter has been "P", and the children have been learning all about the **number 9** through a range of activities. Due to the last week of term being non funded, please could you let Mrs Trigg or Mrs Keidel-Doggrell in the office know if you would like your children to attend. All hours attended will be invoiced.



WILLOW

In Willow Class we have been enjoying the story Lost and Found, using it to inspire creative drawing and labelling in Drawing Club, while the Year Ones have written their own versions where an animal appears at their door. In Maths, Year Ones have been exploring place value

and numbers up to 100, including spotting patterns on a 100 square, while Reception have been practising forming the numbers 4 and 5 in different ways and using positional language during a fun game of "Hide the Teddy," confidently using words like between, under and above. In RE, we continued learning about the Nativity story to support our Nativity practice and thought about the special gifts we might give to baby Jesus, just like the Three Wise Kings. In PSHE, we have been looking at ways that we are different and celebrating this.



SYCAMORE

Sycamore Class have had a wonderfully busy time learning. In Maths, Year 2 have been working confidently on subtracting 2-digit numbers, while Year 3 have been tackling the challenge of adding 3-digit numbers. In English, the children have been carefully editing and improving

their own versions of **Tadpole's Promise** and are looking forward to sharing their published stories with Willow Class. In Science, they thoroughly enjoyed making model hands, using straws and string to show how muscles contract and relax to move our fingers. In History, the class have been comparing the remarkable contributions of Mary Seacole and Florence Nightingale and exploring how both women helped shape modern nursing. Well done Sycamore for another fantastic couple of weeks of learning!



In Oak Class in the last few weeks, we've been busy! In History, we have compared the lives of the Maya and Aztecs and spotted some fascinating similarities and differences. We've

even managed to try reading and writing using Maya symbols. In English, we've started our own High Rise inspired mystery stories with the school as our setting. In science, we've explored reversible and irreversible changes through hands-on investigations. And in RE, we've started to think about who Christians believe Jesus is, and why he is seen as the Messiah.

Huge congratulations to Westbury-on-Severn C of E Primary School on achieving the OPAL

Outdoor Play and Learning Platinum Award. This is an exceptional accomplishment and places Westbury-on-Severn within the top 2% of primary schools nationally for the quality of their outdoor play provision at lunchtime. It is an achievement the whole school community can feel immensely proud of.

I had the absolute pleasure of completing the final audit this November, following 18 months of committed, whole-school engagement in the OPAL programme. The transformation across the site is clear, vibrant and deeply child-centred.

Across the grounds, the play spaces were a lively hive of activity, joy, friendship and inclusion. Children from all year groups were playing across the school's fantastic outdoor areas—making full use of everything the natural environment offers, from autumn leaves to puddles and mud. Pupils engaged confidently in adventurous play, keeping themselves safe enough while developing their own ability to assess and manage risk.

From digging happily in the sandpit and cooking up a storm in the mud kitchen, to scooping and investigating water beads, chalking, dancing and creating obstacle courses, the range and quality of play opportunities were outstanding. The site radiated an overwhelming sense of fun, friendship and freedom.

Westbury-on-Severn's **OPAL Working Party** (HT Anna Mai Armstrong, Curricular Leads Helen Cracknell and Katherine Wills), Play Co-ordinator Cassie Betteridge and Chair of Govs Jen Sigournay have shown excellent teamwork and dedication. They are outstanding ambassadors for children's right to play, as protected by Article 31 of the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child. Their efforts have been strongly supported by the school governors and wider parent community, demonstrating the powerful impact of a unified, whole-school approach.


